International Scholar Spotlight



Dr. Marine Megemont, *Postdoctoral Scholar in the Department of Molecular, Cell, and Systems Biology*

I am originally from the French countryside where I hold a PhD working on the physiopathology of migraine at the University of Clermont-Auvergne. Seeking to experience living abroad and learn state-of-the-art techniques, I decided to move abroad to the US in March 2020 and join Dr Hongdian Yang's lab. When I am not in the lab recording mice's brains, you can find me at the dance studio or at the beach, enjoying everything California has to offer.

Tell us a little bit about your background (before coming to UCR).

I grew up in the French countryside, in a family where nobody was working or interested in science but more in business. But ever since I can remember, my heart was set on biology, I was so interested to understand how the human body works. But I never thought I'd push it that far and end up as a researcher! I kickstarted my journey by earning a Bachelor's degree in Biology from the University of Clermont Ferrand (UCA), the biggest city around where I grew up. After that, I specialized in Pharmacology and got my Master's degree from the same university. During the internship for my master degree I started getting really interested in neuroscience as I was working with the Pr. Philippe Luccarini. Finally, after graduating my master I decided that I would specialize

in Neuroscience, pursuing a Ph.D. at the Neuro-Dol lab under Pr. Philippe Luccarini's guidance. My research was focused on unraveling the mechanisms underlying migraine, and how glial cell/neuron interactions would play a role in the physiopathology of this neurological disorder.

Why did you choose UCR to conduct your research and how has your experience been?

After completing my Ph.D., I really wanted to live abroad for a while and experience doing research in the US. I was set on learning advanced techniques such as in-vivo patch clamp and optogenetics. I started looking for a postdoc opportunity and Dr. Yang's job offer at UCR seemed to be a really good fit for me. Our first interactions left me with a very good impression of him and his lab. Plus, the idea of settling in Riverside felt more doable than moving to a big city like LA. I started at UCR on March 10, 2020, right when the pandemic hit! Despite the timing, my experience has been amazing. The International Student Services (ISS), especially Makbule Koksal, were incredibly helpful whenever I needed support. The work environment has been really good, allowing me to publish a first author paper quickly and advance my career.

What are some of your favorite memories at UCR/Riverside?

I think that since the in-person events started again I didn't miss a single coffee hour from the ISS and I'm looking forward to it each time! Having a feeling that I am part of such a great community is something I've never experienced before and I cherish this a lot. I met amazing people through the international community and some of them became very close friends, and together we created a lot of great memories, such as beach days or hiking in some amazing places in California. I also never lived so close to the ocean, so I really enjoyed spending time on the coast and even started to learn how to surf!

What have been some challenges that you have faced since coming to UCR?

I am very close to my family so moving alone in the US was a big challenge, as I think it's the case for most international scholars. For the first year and a half, because of the pandemic, I couldn't travel back or have any family visits, and spending Christmas alone was a bummer. But moving abroad was a huge step outside my comfort zone that helped me grow so much. Additionally, the cultural shock I initially encountered posed its own set of challenges. Adjusting to different social norms and communication styles in the US compared to those in France required a period of adaptation! But overall American people are very welcoming and caring, always curious to hear about my experience here as a French person.



FAQs for International Scholars

I need to leave the U.S. and ISS has not signed my DS-2019 document! Is that OK?

Please know that you do not need a travel signature on your DS-2019 document to either remain in or to depart the U.S. You do need a valid travel signature to return to the U.S. in J-1 status. A valid travel signature must be no more than twelve months old on the date that you return to the U.S.

If you are departing the U.S. soon and know that your travel signature will expire by the time you expect to return to the U.S., please contact an international scholar advisor at internationalscholars@ucr.edu. If your DS-2019 is going to expire soon, please consult with your department to extend your stay and then contact our scholar advisor.

What will happen if I end my UCR appointment early and/or I depart the United States and do not intend to return to the U.S. for my J program?

If you are a scholar and you depart the U.S. early (more than 15 days before your DS-2019 end date) and you do not intend to return to the U.S. for the remainder of your J program, please discuss this with your faculty sponsor. Please also email our advisor so that she can advise you on the steps and the visa implications of ending your program early.
