### **International Scholar Spotlight**

Pamella Aline de Almeida, Junior Specialist and Visiting Scholar in the Physics Department, currently working as an Experimental Research Assistant in Professor Dr. Jonathan Richardson's laboratory at LIGO

*Tell us a little bit about your background (before coming to UCR).* 

I hold an Undergraduate Degree in Science-Physics from the Brazilian Teaching Education Program for High School, obtained at the Federal University of São Paulo (UNIFESP). I also have a Postgraduate Degree in the Theory of Relativity, obtained at the same institution (UNIFESP). While in Brazil, I taught high school Physics and conducted research in Physics teaching. I have some articles published in Physics magazines for education, and in the last two years, I have started doing research in gravitational waves. Last year, I visited CERN (European Council for Nuclear Research) to learn more about particle physics, as part of a special program for Portuguese language teachers. I was selected along with 19 other teachers from different regions of Brazil. It was an excellent program. Before going to the university to obtain my degree in Physics, I had the opportunity to study mechatronics. Since then, I was in touch with science for real. Before that I was a kid with a lot of curiosity about nature and exploring everything around me.

# Why did you choose UCR to conduct your research and how has your experience been?

I chose UCR because of Dr. Barry Barish. He, together with Dr. Kip Thorne and Dr. Rainer Weiss, were the first Nobel laureates to prove the existence of gravitational waves in LIGO. I was recommended by my professor in Brazil, Dr. Nadja Magalhães, for this experience, and Dr. Barry Barish was very open to receiving me here. He recommended Dr. Jonathan Richardson's laboratory for my research experience. Another important factor in my decision to come to UCR was the university's good reputation within the University of California community. Furthermore, Dr. Jonathan Richardson was very open to having me here. I am learning so much with him and the group. So far my experience here has had a few challenges, but I am grateful. I am working a lot and learning many new things, and this experience has been really great. I really appreciate this journey here, and I hope to have more opportunities to keep working with Dr. Richardson and do research at LIGO.

#### What are some of your favorite memories at UCR/Riverside?

My favorite memories here are having coffee with international scholars and attending parties with them. I also enjoy looking at the mountains around UCR in the morning and after work; I feel happy just by looking at them.

### What have been some challenges that you have faced since coming to UCR?

The first couple of days here were challenging because of the differences between Brazilian and American cultures. At first, it was difficult to talk to people and to understand all the processes involved in obtaining the necessary documents. Finding a place to stay was also very stressful, and managing work and the beginning of my research was difficult. However, everything worked out in the end. Cultural differences are the most challenging aspect for me. While it isn't easy to make friends and understand new people around here, it can also be a little complicated at times. The International Students and Scholars department with special support from Makbule Koksal and Amparo Rios makes this part better. I am grateful for their effort and support.



### **Upcoming Holidays**

#### Memorial Day - Monday, May 29 (UCR Closed)

Memorial Day is observed on the last Monday of May to honor the men and women who have died while serving in the military. Many Americans observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries or memorials, holding family gatherings, and participating in parades. Unofficially, it marks the beginning of the summer season.

#### Juneteenth - Monday, June 19 (UCR Closed)

Celebrated on the 19th of June, Juneteenth marks the day in 1865 when enslaved people in Texas learned they were free. This news was delivered two and a half years after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation became law. Juneteenth has been marked with reverence and celebration by Black American communities long before its recent attainment of national recognition. Juneteenth offers a distinct occasion to acknowledge the linkages that connect our past to our present, while offering signposts for the future.

#### Fourth of July - Tuesday, July 4 (UCR Closed)

The Fourth of July—also known as Independence Day or July 4th—has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1941, but the tradition of Independence Day celebrations goes back to the 18th century and the American Revolution. On July 2nd, 1776, the Continental Congress voted in favor of independence, and two days later delegates from the 13 colonies adopted the Declaration of Independence, a historic document drafted by Thomas Jefferson. July 4th has been celebrated as the birth of American independence, with festivities ranging from fireworks, parades and concerts to more casual family gatherings and barbecues.

### **FAQs for International Scholars**

# I need to leave the U.S. and ISS has not signed my DS-2019 document! Is that OK?

Please know that you do not need a travel signature on your DS-2019 document to either remain in or to depart the U.S. You do need a valid travel signature to return to the U.S. in J-1 status. A valid travel signature must be no more than twelve months old on the date that you return to the U.S.

If you are departing the U.S. soon and know that your travel signature will expire by the time you expect to return to the U.S., please contact an international scholar advisor at <u>internationalscholars@ucr.edu</u>. If your DS-2019 is going to expire soon, please consult with your department to extend your stay and then contact our scholar advisor.

# What will happen if I end my UCR appointment early and/or I depart the United States and do not intend to return to the U.S. for my J program?

If you are a scholar and you depart the U.S. early (more than 15 days before your DS-2019 end date) and you do not intend to return to the U.S. for the remainder of your J program, please discuss this with your faculty sponsor. Please also email our advisor so that she can advise you on the steps and the visa implications of ending your program early.
